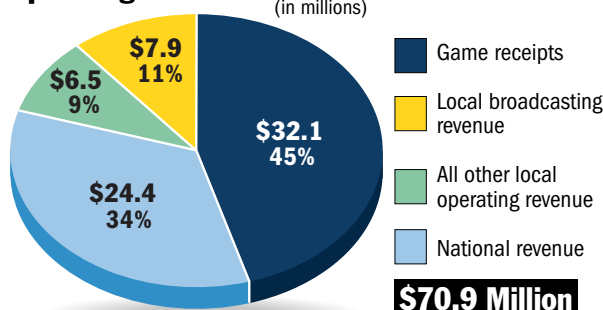

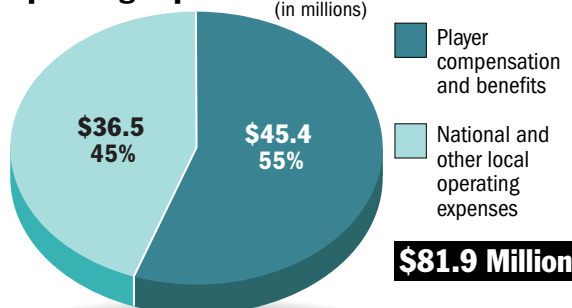
2001 Reds finances

Operating expenses

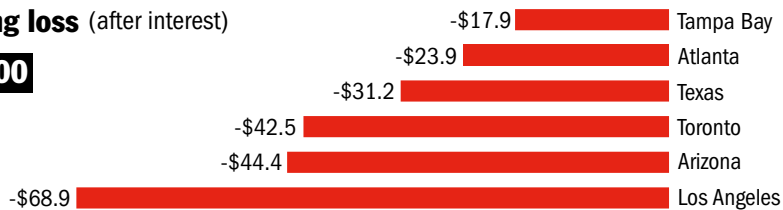
